STATUS OF DISASTERS IN ASIA

- Asia is the most disaster prone continent
- 90% of people affected by natural disasters
- 40% of all reported disasters
- 62 % of economic damage in 2008 (34 % in 2000-2007)
- Affects economies, lives, fabric of human society
- Sheer scale and complexity of natural disasters in recent times
- Many countries struggling to recover

STATUS OF DISASTERS IN ASIA

- These disasters are on a rising trend as a result of many factors including global **climate change**, rapid and unplanned **urbanization**, **environmental degradation** and **depletion of water resources**.
- As a result, there is a feverish intensification of initiatives to address better disaster recovery, disaster reduction, and disaster preparedness



STATUS OF DISASTERS IN ASIA

- Multilevel networking and collaboration have increased among stakeholders of whom NGOs feature prominently, apart from governments and international organizations.
- NGOs play an undeniably critical role
 - their actions range from humanitarian aid to disaster reduction/preparedness and to recovery/rehabilitation.



ASIAN NGOs

- Total number uncertain
- Different definitions/classifications
- Local/national vs International
- Capacities vary
- What is certain is that the number is increasing
- Roles are more evident - they can influence the people



CHALLENGES OF NGOs IN ASIA

- Good practices should be disseminated

- Meeting in February 2002, Kobe, Japan
- Initiative of ADRC & UN-OCHA Kobe
- More than 30 NGOs gathered from all over Asia
- Asian NGOs wanting to take charge
- **Asian Disaster Reduction & Response Network (ADRRN) was formed**

ADRRN - OBJECTIVES

- To develop an interactive network of NGOs committed to achieving excellence in the field of disaster reduction and response.
- To raise the relevant concerns of NGOs in the Asia-Pacific region to the larger community of NGOs globally, through various international forums and platforms
- To promote best practices and standards in disaster reduction and response
- To provide a mechanism for sharing reliable information and facilitating capacity building among network members and other stakeholders.

ADRRN - CURRENT STRENGTH

With a strong footprint in the region, the ADRNN network members are constantly engaged with local communities strengthening their ability to combat disasters, providing humanitarian aid like food, water, shelter and health care, protecting critical facilities like schools and hospitals, creating awareness, advocating for policy changes and improving the capacity of community based organizations.



ADRRN - MEMBERSHIP

ADRRN membership is open to national NGOs with headquarter in Asia-Pacific region and **working in the field of climate change adaptation and disaster reduction and response.**

Types of Membership

1. National NGOs in the Asia Pacific region are eligible as **“Core Members”** with voting rights in the network.
2. Academic Institutes and United Nations organizations or other organizations can also join the network as **“Associate Members”**. Associate members are not entitled to voting rights in the network.



ADRRN - MEMBERSHIP

Requirements for membership

1. Experience in **climate change adaptation** and disaster reduction and response
2. Must be head-quartered in the Asia-Pacific region
3. Vision and objective of the organization in synergy with ADRRN
4. In agreement with ADRRN statutes and member responsibility
